Committee's Response: Rotorua walking and cycling projects in the RLTP include the CBD to Ngongotaha Cycling Route. Additional funding of approximately \$1,100,000 has been budgeted for the construction

phase of this project.

The implementation of the Bay of Plenty Regional Walking and Cycling Strategy includes an action to identify and prioritise improvements to the regional network. Funding has been included in the Transport Planning activity of the RLTP in 2009/10 and 2010/11 to undertake this work and the outcomes of this study can be used to identify projects for funding in future RLTPs and also to provide

Committee's Response: The priority for Walking and Cycling activities is based on a generic profile of HML which ranks them just below the Transport Planning activities on the region's prioritised list of activities for the region. Individual projects with clear safety gains achieved a profile of HHL. The Committee considers this to be the appropriate profile and ranking relative to the other activities on the list. It should be noted that walking and cycling facilities are also provided in conjunction with the large projects where the designs take into account all road users and provide facilities accordingly where they are considered to be

warranted.
