

Together they travelled more than 1.9million kms




3,725 Kiwis got on their bikes for the first time



Transport is changing

Transport is changing and there are challenges and opportunities ahead of us – and we need to think and act differently as a sector



Draft Government Policy Statement – cycling

The Ministry of Transport has released the draft GPS www.transport.govt.nz/gps2018

Additional \$65m during 2015-18, bringing total to \$167m Proposed upper limit \$65m each year during 2018-21 Long term result: Increased safe cycling through improvement of cycle networks

- Dedicated cycle networks in main urban areas are expanded and completed
- Suburban routes for cyclists are improved
- Cycleway network connections, including to the NZ Cycle Trails are improved
- Feedback to MOT by end of March

National Land Transport Programme 2018-2021

What is it?

- Sets out how we'll use National Land Transport funding
- Represents our commitment to a high quality, safe and reliable transport system that will continue to enable
 New Zealand to thrive
- It's how we give effect to the Government Policy Statement on Land Transport




The 'Bigger Picture'

- Is the start of a conversation on the big picture
- Reflects our current understanding of the transport network
- Captures current pressure points

Identifies the four key factors that will shape our transport

system for the future:

- economic
- environmental
- population
- technology



Business Case Approach (BCA) Capability Initiative

The sector identified the need to improve Business Case:

- Leadership
- Expertise
- Expectations and guidance
- Clarity and consistency in language
- Pragmatism and Fit For Purpose effort and communication



National cycling 10 year programme

Purpose

To develop a ten year cycling programme for June 2018 - 2028

Gives us

- Understanding what different streams of investment are aimed at achieving
- Identifies priorities for investment
- Will inform development of activities into RLTPs and NLTP
- Provides information to inform Long Term Strategic View
- National map (developing) setting out current and future network

OUR NATIONAL CYCLING PROGRAMME



National cycling 10 year programme

Phase 1 - Scope and strategic case (Feb - March)

- Develop methodology
- Write and test strategic case
- Gather information from Councils/Trails/HNO

Phase 2 - Programme compilation and assessment (March - May)

- Compile information across different investment streams
- Workshop programme options
- Test with key stakeholders

Phase 3 - Programme finalisation and approval (June)

- Finalise business case
- Seek approval from Transport Agency Board
- Release and communicate



NZCT Great Rides

Budget 2016 - \$25 million over 4 years to further enhance and extend Great Rides

Priority is to ensure:

- Good to Great: eg, NZCT Design Guide compliance, safety first, consistent experience, counters, signage, realising original vision
- Enhancement: eg, access to services, points of interest, trail flow
- Extension: eg, connecting to local town, hub or another trail



NZCT Great Rides and Heartland Rides

Phases:

- Concept Phase 10 year vision for trail and changes planned by project
- Business Case Phase (template out soon) a fit for purpose, detailed rationale that clearly outlines the problems and benefits
- Implementation Plan detailed project plan, committed timeline and funding agreement
- Implement implementing the project, sign-off

Where NLTF investment may be sought for work on local roads, Council must apply for funding and business case will provide evidence for need of investment (and support activity getting into RLTP)

NLTP Dialogue

- First tranche of NLTP Dialogue information on web www.nzta.govt.nz/planning-and-investing
 - Completing strategic networks in high growth and main urban areas
 - Supporting RED through connections to Great Rides and high priority Heartland Rides
 - Expectations for clarity on target users and fit for purpose infrastructure
 - Using Cycle Network Guidance to guide levels of service
 - Integrated programme must include wrap-around activities
 - Look for opportunities across wider transport programme –
 SH and local road improvements, M&O, speed programmes
 - Encourage partnerships and co-investment
