CAW November meeting report

Submission on the National Walking & Cycling Strategy

The Ministry of Transport is consulting on the National Walking & Cycling Strategy. Kate will co-ordinate the CAW submission. There is a public meeting about the Strategy on 5 December at Turnbull House. More info at www.transport.govt.nz/business/land/getting-there.shtml

Waterfront access

Lou and Patrick are checking with WCC and Wellington waterfront Ltd on cycle access and parking around the waterfront.

CAW's Technical & Planning Group

WCC is changing traffic layout at **Wellington hospital**, prior to the new hospital building being designed. We looked at preliminary plans, and identified some concerns but also some good things e.g. extra set of lights. Robert is writing our submission.

Island Bay roundabout - there is concern that the deflection of entry points is wrong, and will encourage speeding. Also the cycle lanes should be marked and coloured up to the Give Way lines at the roundabout. Jane is writing a submission.

Wellington Regional Cycle Forum

The latest meeting of the Cycle Forum was held on 4 November, with Jane Dawson attending.

Opus Consulting reported on a research project they are doing on 'Balancing the needs of motorists and cyclists'. The first phase of the programme is an experiment into understanding the effects of line markings and other road obstacles on cycle stability. This work has been completed.

The second phase concerns observations of cyclists as they manage roadside hazards and conflict with general traffic. Opus observed volunteer cyclists over two 10km courses in Upper Hutt and videoed them as they negotiated raised pavement markers, narrow bridges, reduction of the shoulder, gravel, debris and raised utility access covers, and other obstacles.

The third phase is a survey of parents who drop their children at school, and those who allow them to cycle, in an attempt to estimate the size of the concern for safety of the road environment as an impediment to school children cycling. The report will be available by June 2004.

Wellington City Council reported that signage for cyclists will be improved around the airport area, and that the Island Bay cycle route will be upgraded next year. Kapiti Coast's Road Safety Co-ordinator reported that they had 150 children turn up for their cycle skills day, and that a video is being made about 'defensive cycling'.

Porirua City Council have produced a map identifying walking tracks in their area, and which ones are also OK for cycling. It will go up on their website, and be available in hard copy. They are still awaiting approval from Tranzrail to go ahead with the bridge at Pukerua Bay, to extend the Ara Harakeke path.

The Wellington Region of the **Police** are working to bring down urban speed and enforce intersection give way rules.

Transit NZ are sealing the path between Pukerua Bay and Paekakariki, but are only signposting it for northbound use as there isn't enough room for opposing cyclists to pass. Plastic markers have been removed from the cycle path at Pukerua Bay, as they were getting knocked over and laying across the cycle track.

The **Wellington Veteran Cycling Club** had prepared a long list of things getting worse for cyclists over the last few years, like on road space for cyclists diminishing so that where once cyclists were able to ride two abreast, now there is little room for a group to ride single file, and drivers (both private and truck) operating with little concern for other road users.

BikeWise are going full steam ahead with planning for National Bike Week, and are running the Business Bike Battle again.

Green Bikes in Porirua now have coin-operated locks for the bikes - put in a \$2 coin, and get it back when you return the bike. They are looking at where to situate them.

The **Wellington Regional Council** had 25 submissions on its draft Regional Cycling Strategy, and all except 3 were supportive. It will go to the Regional Land Transport Committee in March 2004. The Council has contracted a project manager to run Road Safety Week in the second week of February, and has sourced extra funding to help with it. A 'Share the Road' campaign, based on the Waimakariri "don't burst my bubble" programme, will be run that week, which is the week before Bike Week.
